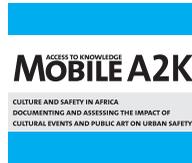

# 1. Introduction

*Culture and Safety in Africa: Developing a Methodology Guide* is a five-day workshop which gathers international scholars and experts in order to produce a methodology guide to analyze and evaluate the impact of cultural events and public art on urban safety in Africa. The workshop specifically focuses on the cities of Douala, Luanda and Johannesburg and it involves scholars and experts in architecture, design, urban studies, philosophy, sociology and African culture from Switzerland, Italy, France, Belgium, Cameroon, South Africa and Angola.

As the Millennium Development Goals declare, the achievement of a significant improvement in the lives of at least 100 million slum dwellers is essential: safety is a priority.

Our research project *Mobile AzK: Culture and Safety in Africa. Documenting and assessing the impact of cultural events and public art on urban safety* focuses on safety with a specific, interdisciplinary and comparative approach. The focus is on the analysis of innovative and reviewed cultural events and public art installations produced in three violent and unsafe African cities: Douala, Johannesburg and Luanda.

Cultural events and public art are not meant to produce safety: they are a space of experimentation with side effects, one of those is safety. Douala is the location of a major cultural event on public art and of a critical number of public installations conceived in over twenty years. Johannesburg is at the centre of a policy of urban renovation implemented through cultural initiatives. Luanda has assisted in the last seven years to a post-war cultural strategy.

The research addresses the questions: “How cultural events and public art affect urban safety in African cities?” and “Can we assess these changes as positive according to a group of factors?”.

These questions rely on the hypothesis that arts are a space for experimentation and research, not directly connected to urban safety, but capable of triggering unforeseen ways of producing higher livability, civil cohabitation and social cohesion.

The Council of Europe approved a new strategy for social cohesion in 2004 and the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (2007) published *Enhancing urban safety and security Global report on human settlements*, but without specific focus on arts and culture. Studies conducted at the University of Basel are focusing on the status of African contemporary art and artists, see T. Förster, *Visual Presence and Competition in Urban Africa*, in: *Critical Interventions*, 2008, n. 2. Informal studies have assessed the experimental capacity of those experiences of producing livability, civil cohabitation and social cohesion, the main features of urban safety.

Further knowledge and an interdisciplinary and comparative approach is needed to acknowledge the role and the impact of cultural events and public art on safety. This knowledge made available at a local and international level through ict and mobile phone technology is essential to allow researchers, ngos and policy makers to consider new ways of improving the lives of slum dwellers. ## 2. Scientific aims and methods of the workshop

The workshop *Culture and Safety in Africa: Developing a Methodology Guide* aims at producing a methodology guide to analyse the impact of culture on urban safety in Africa, and to develop the necessary and specific research tools for future research.

The workshop focuses on sociological and urban factors, questions, and comparable elements, and it considers the specific contexts of Douala in Cameroon, Luanda in Angola, and Johannesburg in South Africa. The parallel sessions address the subjects with a focus on micro vs. macro and positive vs. negative effects of arts and culture on urban safety, documenting the status of points of interest, neighborhoods and cities before and after events or installations take place.

The methodology guide includes a list of questions for interviewees, criteria to measure on site, a checklist of materials to collect.

1. Which information is necessary to describe cultural events and public art? Which elements need to be described? Which sources can be used? Which are the questions that need to be addressed? Which tool can we use to present/represent this information?

2. Which information is necessary to describe in a urban context safety and security and unsafely and insecurity? Which sources can be used? Which are the questions that need to be addressed? How is it possible to identify and describe a change in safety and security? Which tool can we use to present/represent this information?

3. Which are the results expected from the research by the different institutions involved? How is it possible to allow the institutions to benefit the most from the research? Which are the critical point of such a research? Can the research produce negative effect? Is the independence and the experimentation of culture in danger?

Three researchers will use the methodology guide in 2012 and 2013 in Douala, Johannesburg and Luanda. They are asked to gather information on public art, cultural events and urban safety in those cities and to develop further a series of specific case studies. The methodology guide will also be used as a support for comparative analysis .

The idea of the methodology guide relays on the experience of the *African Copyright and Access to Knowledge (ACA2K) methodology guide* (<http://www.aca2k.org/>) and it develops it further by adapting it to the specific needs of the present research.

## 3. Expected results

The workshop collects daily reports and gathers data, factors and a list of questions and stakeholders to be addressed during field research.

The methodology guide will be published in its first edition by June 2012 with a creative commons attribution share-alike license. A second edition amended by the internal advisors and external evaluators will be released by the end of 2013. A paper on the development of the methodology guide is planned as an application to the call for papers for the African Cities Reader, a series of books published by Chimurenga and the African Centre for Cities.

## 4. Programme

A set of short keynote speeches on case studies and on existing international projects opens each day. Each day is organized with plenary sessions and small working groups. Each group produces deliverables, reports and visual documentation.

Fabio Vanin is an architect and urban designer, holding a PhD in Urbanism from University Iuav of Venice, completed in 2008 with the thesis “Maputo Open City – Investigations on an African Capital City”. He worked as project leader for several strategic plans in Europe (Antwerp, Gent, Gorzow, Poznan) and Africa (Nairobi), and as research assistant at TU Eindhoven and at University of Witwatersrand, Johannesburg. In 2009 he co-founded LATITUDE - Platform for Urban Research and Design, where he is currently involved in an international comparative research on water based urbanism, “Floating Urbanism”.

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## 5. Venue

The workshop takes place at the Villa iza in Vico Morcote, the former premise of the SCI-Arc, a Los Angeles based school of architecture. We chose this building for its isolated position, its outstanding setting and the possibility to host the participants both for day time activities and for night time. The villa is a four-storey building, hosting up to 23 people and offering a lecture hall for common activities and two studios for parallel sessions. The villa is provided with a kitchen and a restaurant.
